when someone challenges the NASD jurisdiction over a case, saying it belongs in federal court.

Attorneys are responsible for writing up the specifics of arbitrators' rulings, as well.

Fronstin, who previously worked as a state's attorney on cases that could last up to five years, finds this work more satisfying. "This system definitely works; both sides have an opportunity to be heard," he says. "Here, people are usually satisfied with the process. Even if they don't like the result, they respect how our office handled it."

## Mediation


Mediation differs from arbitration (see box below and on page 7). Claire Moritt and Leon deLeon, Mediation Administrators, handle all of the Ft. Lauderdale office's mediation cases, assisted by support staff member Caroline White. Last year, the group exceeded its goal of resolving 175 cases; this year, its goal is 210 cases. Moritt and deLeon actively pursue getting cases to mediation by addressing public forums and pursuing leads from arbitration staff.

"We get letters from customers saying they are satisfied with the process," deLeon says. "They tell

us that without our contacting them, they'd never have reached the mediation table to resolve the dispute."

Moritt and deleon are passionate about their jobs. Moritt says, "We help people get closure to their problems, knowing they are getting a fair and efficient resolution to their dispute."

"We had one client who had seven mediations in one day, all with the same respondent and claimant's counsel," she continues. "They had been at each other's throats all day, but at the end of the day, they shook hands and went to dinner together. That, to me, is
